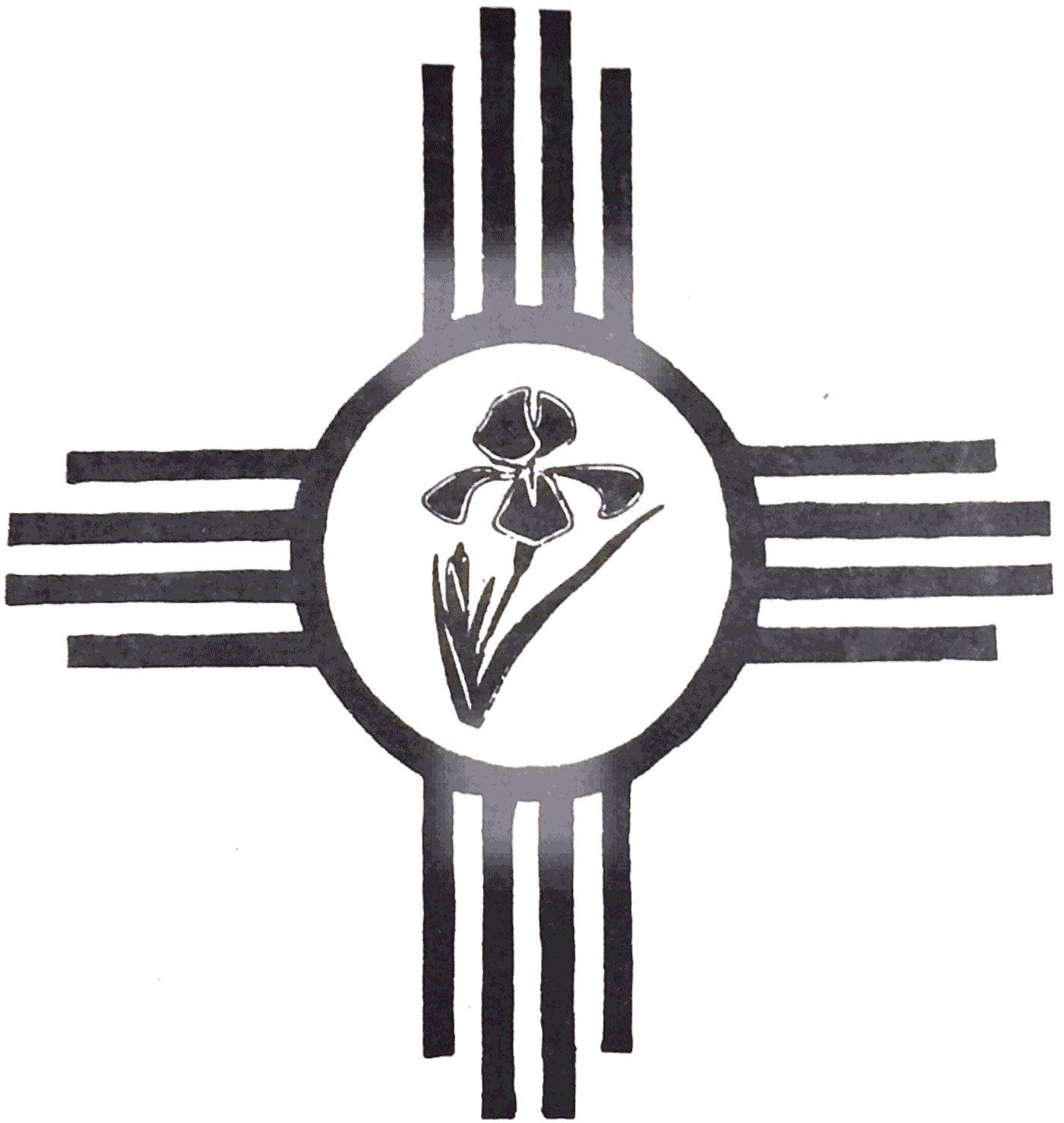

On The Light Side

More Irisarian Laws

Help the Editor...

If you or your local society has news articles about your local happenings and events please share them with the other members in the Region. CHOOSING & GROOMING IRISES FOR THE SHOW

A specimen for show must be unmarred and in its prime. It must not be over mature or under mature. It should not have any broken or bedraggled, spent or damaged parts. It must not be disfigured or have wind or weather damage.

If leaves are present they should be clean and without defects. They may be wiped with a cloth but not polished. This is also true of the stems and the branches.

If there are faded or dead flowers on the stalk they should be carefully removed. Care should be taken to see that the spathes are not injured, but folded neatly back over the scars.

Also be sure there are no broken or damaged buds or evidence of damage to open flowers or other parts of the specimen.

An exhibit is not disqualified because of removed flowers or other parts, but points are taken off for broken or damaged buds, or evidence of damage to open flowers or other parts of the specimen.

Dust or dirt may be removed from flowers preferably with wet cotton. A "que tip" is good for this purpose. Insects are a "no no", and must be removed.

Fading of color is not always objectionable. Pale blues can fade to pure white, medium blues can fade to pale blue, and medium pinks that fade to light pink may retain their attractiveness. Substance tells whether the fading is due to sunlight or to age. The typical listed color of a cultivar is always to be given credit.

Texture should enhance color. It may be silky, smooth, or velvety. Rough texture is not pleasing and should be penalized.

Tall bearded iris flower sizes normally range from 4" to 7", measured in width, not top to bottom. Extra points can be given if the grower has obtained extra size for a particular variety, if all other factors are equal. However, large size is not desirable if it weakens form or substance, or coarsens texture.

The number of flowers varies with the variety. Three or more open blooms should receive full credit (15 points) if that is typical of the variety, in which case 2 open blooms would receive 12 points, and one open bloom 7 points. However, if a variety typically opens only one bloom at a time in the garden, it should receive the full 15 points on the show bench for one bloom. Multiple blooms on an exhibition stalk are required only if such performance is typical for the variety.

If the season is late or generally bad and all exhibits show fewer than three or four flowers, leniency is suggested. It is not enough to have 5 blooms open if those 5 blooms are crowded together in a shapeless blob. Two, three or four well spaced, well angled flowers might present a better appearance and win after due consideration of other qualities.

SOUTHWEST GARDEN TIP---Water Loss

Don't depend on natural rainfall or snowfall to meet all the water needs of your landscape, orchard or garden. Perennial plants (trees and shrubs especially) continue to have water needs even during the winter. Evergreen plant materials have continuous water needs, because they retain their foliage and continue to lose water through them even in the dormant season. But even deciduous plant material will lose some moisture through trunks, branches, stems and buds in the dormant season. The root systems of all plants must have water to survive winter conditions. When watering trees and shrubs always **deep water**. The cold weather maybe leaving the region but the dry winds are fastly blowing upon our landscapes and the problem of dry windburned coupled with the winter freeze damage will show up in many of our beautiful landscapes. With the extremes of temperature and weather conditions be on guard to help your green growing investments out.
